Prescription help

Goodrx.com has great discounts on medication and shows you where it is the cheapest. There is a code on there that the pharmacy enters into their computer to provide the discount. So, they would just need to show that printed or on their phone to the pharmacy.

I worked as a medical social worker prior to being a counselor. Some drug companies offer medication through an indigent drug program. That all must be done through the doctor's office and is usually based on income and insurance.

Call you local hospital and ask for a case management nurse. They would have all of this info.

You might also call 211 and see if they keep a listing.

Also depends upon what medicine you are needing the discount for.

Walgreens has a discount program and at Meijer and Walmart many prescriptions are free. Also, if the parent has a doctor, have them ask their doc for samples.

There is <u>goodrx.com</u> that we have used as a family. Sometimes it is cheaper than with our insurance and sometimes it is cheaper to use the coupon through that website.

If they are low to moderate income suggest they apply for Medicaid. Even if they are not approved, they have a chance at the HIP program which dramatically reduces prescription costs.

I've had luck calling the manufacturer directly. Some of them have programs, but they are generally individual company sponsored.

What medication is it for? She can always go to that's drugs website and see if they offer any discount or free programs. For example, the makers of quillivant for ADHD offer a discount and free program for their medication if you meet the standards and apply.

<u>needymeds.org</u> is another site. I checked with CVS. parents can actually take both discount cards in and they will give them the biggest discount from the two sites.

The app GoodRx allows you to search for the pharmacies in your area that offer the cheapest price for the prescription you're looking for from your doctor.

Familywize.org Specific medication websites sometimes provide parents with discounts or samples.

Calling your family physician and requesting assistance or another comparable medication that is less expensive can be another option.

<u>www.needymeds.com</u> is a great resource for financial assistance with medication. One can find links to companies/agencies that will provide medications free of charge or at a reduced charge. Just type in the medication and the site will connect with resources available for that medication.
